Our primary goal for today though was to explore the Greenwich and Millennium Docklands area which is an enormous development post the London Olympics. According to the dialogue on the cable car across the Thames to the O_2 stadium this is the area that will have >200,000 inhabitants in the next few years. Construction is everywhere.

The trip there was done on the driverless DLR train service set up for the Olympics and we were attracted to the portrayal of the cities of the future presented in an impressive building, The Crystal.

As you can see below Marg had a shot had developing a sustainable city with development of infrastructure and services to a budget. The resultant city survived for 10 years before everyone died of thirst and anarchy prevailed. Dave's attempt lasted 9 years B.



The cable car then took us from The Crystal across the Thames to O_2 in Greenwich North. A double Decker bus from there and we were soon in Greenwich. Apart from the Maritime museum, the Cutty Sark and Greenwich Markets Dave's main focus was on the Observatory where the standard GMT (Greenwich Mean Time) is set and the related Prime Meridian (O^0 longitude). Didn't realise that this would require a substantial almost vertical climb to the top of the little hill but we were really pleased to get there.
